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HUD Guidelines state:

"A Continuum of Care is established by representatives of relevant organizations within a geographic area to carry out the responsibilities set forth in the CoC Program interim rule. The composition of each CoC is expected to be tailored to its unique community circumstance, to the extent possible involving all of the players required to further local efforts to end homelessness. The purpose of requiring stakeholder representation from a wide range of organizations within the CoC's geographic area is to ensure that all community stakeholders participate in developing and implementing a range of housing and services."

Examples of CoC Representatives: nonprofit homelessness assistance providers, victim services providers, faith-based organizations, governments, businesses, advocates, public housing agencies, school districts, social services providers, mental health agencies, hospitals, universities, affordable housing developers, law enforcement, organizations serving veterans, homeless or formerly homeless individuals.
